Tips for families

Every student attending DLC brings their own diverse language learning experience. Supporting your child's language journey can sometimes be difficult. Here are some simple tips to enhance their language learning and boost their motivation.

Show an interest in Language learning



- Ask your child a simple question about what they are learning.
- What's one new word or phrase you learnt today?
- What was your favourite activity in Language class?
- Compare and contrast languages.
- What was something that was different to English?
- What is something that is similar?



Labels around the home

Label rooms or items in your house in Language. See extra sheet for some labels to start you off. Ask your teacher for additional words or consult a dictionary available in our library.

Access online learning sites to supplement learning

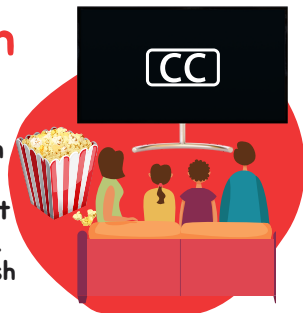
Start using everyday words as a family
